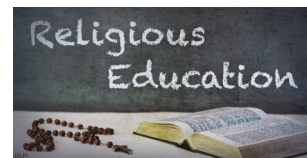

Sins of Omission

Week after week at Mass we pray the Confiteor, a prayer of confession in which we admit that we have sinned in our thoughts, in our words, in what we have done and in what we have failed to do. Those things that we have failed to do are the sins of omission.

I bring this up because of something that happened a couple of weeks ago. A woman was raped for forty minutes on a subway train in Philadelphia. Forty minutes and not one person intervened or said a word.

Last week on a subway train in New York City a video caught a large man who punched a woman half his size in the face, full fisted and not holding back. How she didn't crumble to the ground I don't know. The video caught something else as well. It documented that no one came to her defense or even asked if she was alright.

Here's a question worth asking ourselves, if we were among the people on those trains, and we knew what was happening, and did nothing to stop it, would that make us complicit in those assaults. By not doing or saying anything would we be just as guilty of that rape or that physical assault?

I bring this up because, once again, there's a ballot question coming down the pike that would legalize physician assisted suicide. In the typical doublespeak from the proponents of such things, the proposed bill avoids the reality of the word suicide and they prefer to present it with phrases like "compassionate care for the terminally ill," or "aid in dying," or simply the "right to die." I know of nothing in the Constitution that mentions the right to die, although it prominently mentions the right to life.

We are on a slippery slope with this. Although the proposed law would put some limitations in place, for example, the dying person would have to be at least 18 years old, and be of sound mind, it also makes an accommodation for guardians to make the decision on behalf of the one who is dying.

If this is where it starts, where will it be in forty or fifty years. Will the "compassionate" thing be to end the life of those with severe disabilities, people with down syndrome, the mentally ill or just the elderly.

In 1973, after *Roe v Wade*, abortions were not typically performed after the 12th week of pregnancy. Today, in many places, an abortion can be obtained through the ninth month and lawmakers would not even pass legislation that would require basic medical care, even palliative care, to a baby born alive after an attempted abortion. Yet we are all appalled, rightfully so, when a young mother abandons her newborn in the trash.

In 1973 and beyond, trying to avoid the inconvenient truth that abortion kills, proponents argued, for example, that an embryo was simply a blob of flesh and not human at all, at least not yet – it can be removed. They also rationalized that if a baby could not live outside of its mother's womb it could be denied the opportunity to live within the womb as well, through abortion. Today it's been taken to new lows – down that slippery slope to where a child (and that's what it is) can be killed (and that's what it is) even minutes before birth. Thankfully this is rare but even that is too often when it comes to taking a human life.

What have we done lately to speak up against these kinds of assaults on human life? A couple of weeks ago there were people in front of our church looking for signatures for a ballot initiative opposing assisted suicide. I was surprised at how few signatures they had received. The silence is deafening. Can we not take even a couple of minutes to put our name on a document that demonstrates our commitment to life? When was the last time any of us sent a letter, made a phone call or sent an email to senator or representative voicing our support for life issues?

Do we, by our silence, by our complacency, by just sitting back and not doing anything become guilty by omission? Are we, by our inaction, inadvertently assisting in those suicides? Are we, by our inaction complicit in the loss of life from abortions?

When we don't take a stand against racism and hatred aren't we somehow tacitly giving our approval to it? If we don't share our bounty with the hungry around us, are we not guilty of perpetuating their hunger?

These are sins of omission. I'm guilty of it – we all are. So, let's not just stand around but let's do something!

I'll end as we end the Confiteor, praying for you and asking for your prayers.

Therefore, I ask blessed Mary Ever-Virgin,
all the Angels and Saints,
and you, my brothers and sisters,
to pray for me to the Lord our God. AMEN.
